Why Parent Involvement?

Student Success

The most accurate predictors of student success in school are when the family is able to:

- * Create an environment that encourages learning**
- * Communicate high, yet reasonable, expectations for their child's achievement and future career**
- * Become involved in the child's education at school and in the community**

Student Achievement

- * **When parents are involved, students tend to achieve more, regardless of socioeconomic status, ethnic/racial background, or parent's education level.**
- * **Students whose parents are involved in their lives have higher graduation rates and greater enrollment rates in postsecondary education**
- * **In programs designed to involve parents in full partnerships, student achievement for disadvantaged children not only improves but can reach levels that are standard to middle-class children**

Student Behavior

- * When parents are involved, students usually have better attitudes, are more motivated toward school, and have better self-esteem.**
- * Students whose parents are involved in their education often show improved behavior and have lower rates of suspension for disciplinary reasons.**
- * Educators tend to hold higher expectations of students whose parents collaborate with teachers. They also hold higher opinions of those parents.**

Parenting Skills

Social/Emotional

- * Parents show more sensitivity to their child's needs, become more accepting, and are more affectionate and less likely to use punishments instead of praise to change behavior**

Problem Solving

- * Parents use more complex language, and encourage more verbal skills and exploratory behaviors**

School Quality

- * Schools with a high degree of parent involvement have more support from families and better reputations in the community**
- * School programs that involve parents usually outperform identical programs without parent involvement**
- * Teachers and principals feel more respected and have higher levels of job**
